

Strengthening women's equal participation in rural local self governance (Panchayati Raj Institutions) and address gender issues



Our Strategy

• Develop capacity and provide handholding support to women elected leaders to actively participate in decision making processes and governing, ensuring democratic leadership.

• Develop capacity of women voters through self help groups to engage in Annual Action Plan of the Village Council, contribute in implementation and monitoring of service delivery & create strong support base for the women leaders.

• Engage in a dialogue with male political leadership and elected representatives regarding impact of patriarchy and the role that gender equitable governance could play in catalyzing social development.

• Prepare the political machine and system to accept, seek and support active women leaders, promote women's issues through Gender Responsive Budgeting and gender maninstreaming within political party structures.

• Create a pool of future leaders in the community to create both a supply of empowered women leaders who can govern well as well as demand for these leaders.

Highlights for 2018-19

Panchayat elections took place this amidst a lot of controversy and judicial intervention. It took a while to for the new board to get formed and become finctional.

We held a 2 days workshop with the elected representatives and opinion leaders of 2 Gram Panchayat in Birbhum, Daskal Kareya II Gram Panchayat and Kirnahar I Gram Panchayat. 37 participants were present in the workshop.

Some of the issues identified by the leaders for gender responsive budgeting:-

O Awareness to address harassment on women to encourage women's free mobility within the community.

O Encourage and support women voices protesting gender based violence and discrimination

- O Give importance to women's opinion and choice in terms of economic endeavours.
- O Provide space to women during decision making

O Work with women to change their mindset

O Greater awareness about govt schemes among women

O Discussion on how to make the budget more gender inclusive

Details of Gramm Sansad Sabha & Voter Participation


As a result of advocacy, Kirnahar GP, Birbhum & Dakshin Gangadharpur GP in Pathar Protima Block formed a committee prior to the gram sansad sabhas and invited the members of Nari Jagaran Committeed to play an active role in spreading awareness about the November gram sansad sabhas and hold neighbourhood meetings to motivate the community to identify needs. 64 such meetings took place in Birbhum and 11 in South 24 Parganas, led by the members of the Nari Jagaran Committees.

Effective GSS took place in 6 GPs, with women's participation way higher than male.

Apart from specific demands for inclusion into governemnt schemes like widow and old age oensions, housing schemes, infrasructural improvement like road reparing, concrete road building, tubewell, electricity etc, women particularly raised issues acout ending human & child trafficking, early marriage, domestic violence, illegal liqor, awareness raising on these issues, skill development for livelihood like mushroom, vermicmpost, fish farming, tailoring unit, nursery, job card etc. Building more toilets and creating better lighting in the streetsnd lanes for women's safety were raised frequently.






Our work with the Gram Panchayat has remained confined to Birrbhum and South 24 Parganas essentially. In Purulia, much of our work is concentrated on mobilizing and strengthening women voters and making them aware of their rights and entitlements.

Some Other Results



The elected representatives were actively involved in monitiring services related to health & education. They, and especially the women elected representatives made frequest visits to the ICDS centres, primary schools, VHND camps, 2nd (SHG) and 4th Saturday (health) meetings. 16 women elected representatives (11 from the earlier term and 5 from the new term) remain active with the Nari Jagaran Committees.




Social Mobilization & Institutional development in the community



We work with the community women to strengthen them by activating their understanding of gender equality to enable them mobilize themselves into functional "Nari Jagaran Committees" in order to stand by the side of women facing violence and spread awareness on the issue. These committees are the nodal point where a woman comes with her complaints. These Committees also enable each other and other women to become active voters and demand for their entitlements & accountability from the local self governance . The NJCs also encourage self expression through creation and strengthening of Theatre Groups and any other form that community women bring forward.

Activities unbdertaken to strengthen the NJCs

Involvement in International Campiagns through national and state level networks

Equidiversity Foundation is an active member of AMAN Glovbal Voices for Peace in the Homes against domestic violence and a state level netwrok against child marriage called Bhabna. This year, on behalf of both the networks, we organized awareness programmes in Birbhum and South 24 Parganas.



We began the month by organising and mobilized the community and the Gram Panchayat to observe the International Campaign to Stop Violence against women and girls' on 4 December. As a member of an International Network – Aman: Global Voices for Peace in the Homes, this was our opportunity to talk about domestic violence and its impact on children, impact of early marriage and the link between early marriage and domestic violence and the importance of the community action against such acts of violence. The programme met with an overwhelming response as it reached out to more than 350 people, mainly women and importantly 12 out of 18 newly elected representatives and a few elected representatives from an earlier term came to support the issue. Headmaster of Bhajna Benepara Primary School wrote a song on the issue and women sang

On behalf of Bhabna Network, EDF organized a public awareness programme in Nanoor Block, in association with the Kirnahar II and DK II Gram Panchayats. The programmes was enthusiastically supported by the elected representatives at the Panchayat and the Panchayat Samity levels and was also attended by the Officer-in-Charge of the local Police Station and the headmistress of a girls' high school. the programme was attended by more than 500 women and adolescent girls and memners of the Bhabna Network.

Following the overwhelming support from the community and administration during the BhabnaProgramme, EquidiversityFoundation was invited by Kirnahar T.P.M High School for Girls forawareness with the adolescent girls. The programme wasattended by more than 1500 girls.



This year also saw 9 members of Nari Jagaran Committee from Purulia, Birbhum and South 24 Parganas participting in two 7 days long residential trainings on "Case Work" and "Mental Health & Wellbeing" organized by Swayam.

Women's Participation in Livelihood Activities



Duck farming, South 24 Parganas

It is well established that ducks have less mortality rate and usually they live longer than chickens. In case of egg production, ducks lay eggs for a long time period. Duck products such as eggs and meat have a great demand in the local and international market. Hence, commercial duck farming business can be a great source of earning. Keeping these benefits in mind, we had proposed small scale 'khaki campbell' duck rearing for 25 women and had distributed 305 ducklings in January 2019. We received financial support from SXC Alumni 1960-61.

After 4 months, 220 ducklings have survived. One woman lost all her 20 ducklings due to an illness contracted from her chickens. The untimely rain and chill killed some as well. A few women were unable to protect the ducklings from been attacked and taken away by wild cats.

The ducklings are expected to lay eggs in a couple of months.

Of the 25 women who received the ducklings,

- 1 woman has decided to start a farm with 300 ducklings and
- another is planning to start a hatchery. We are working with these women to enable them to develop a micro investment plan and get a resource person for skill development.



Response of Local Government

We have been able to motivate Dakshin Gangadharpur GP to support the poorest of these women by building huts for the ducklings under the MGNREGS scheme. 5 women have been chosen for this and the GP has already submitted its plan.



We also tied up with the Block administration who provided vaccines for these ducklings free of cost.

Muri Making, Birbhum

7 women went to Kharagpur and took a training on Muri making using the machine. A total of 17 women are involved in the Muri making business following a rotation strategy.

Our work to strengthen Children's Autonomy & Leadership to promote child rights, gender equality and child protection

We work with children of primary schools through a process of "Child Parliament" to enable them to look at their problems, find solutions and voice their opinion in a shared space particularly on issues like child safety, early marriage, gender equality malnourishment and environment sustainability.

Our goal is to work to :

* Increase autonomy and awareness among children (through better emotional health, life skills, awareness and information, exposure) to equip them to understand democratic values, critically think, take decisions and deal with issues that concern them, particularly around rights, safety and protection.

* Increase ability to challenge dominant forms of masculinity and femininity by which boys and girls develop a transforming mindset towards equality, equity and social justice.

* Enable an improved ecosystem around children by creating better practices among institutions that affect their lives (Primary Schools, Family, women self helpgroups, Local Gram Panchayat) particularly in areas of child protection and furthering child rights.

* Enable children and youth to become agents of change and social entrepreneurs.



• 92% of children are able to recall name, concept and action plan around gender, good touch-bad touch, nutrition

• 74% children report expressing themselves through Moner Baksho is one favourite activity

• 78% children said they wanted more discussion around gender

• 54% children said that they wanted to have more skill oriented activities

Active Involvement of Children in CP





One of the highlights of the work was the particlipation of children and the school in an elaborate election process to elect the Cabinet and its Prime Minister. The process included nomination of candidates, casting votes in a sectret ballot, vote counting and declaration of winners. This was followed by formation of the cabinet with 5 Cabinet Ministers and their deputies (who are the second most popular candidate by votes), led by the Prime Minister.

Networks and Partnerships

As a member of Aman: Global Voices for Peace in the Homes - a national network against domestic violence & State level Bhabna Network, Equidiversity Foundation actively organized programmes to observe the Internattional Campaign to Stop Violence Against Women & Girls, and has been a key player in designing a study around Child marriage on behalf og Bhabna.

As a non-funded partner of TDH, we were able to contribute at State Level Consultations on reintegration of vulnerable children & development of on-line resource directory called "Empower Plus'. As partners, 4 team members also participated in various capacity development programmes like counseling, Advocacy, Project Managemnet Cycle etc

Working as a Resource Organization

- In 2017-2018, we offered our services as a Resource Organizaion and built capacity of
- 100 women farmers associated with Jeevika Development Society, NGO working on women's empowerment on gender and PRI in a phase I training. EDF also is involved in a process of mentoring the Jeevika team of 4 on gender issues.
- Our Managing Trustee worked as a Consultant with Swayam to integrate gender in rural governance in Diamond Harbour, South 24 Parganas & offered her services to Start Up, a Delhi based organization on reasearch and proposal writing.
